STORMWATER TIPS FOR WASHING VEHICLES AT HOME AND COMMUNITY/CHARITY CAR WASHES

For many who own or operate a vehicle, there is nothing quite like having a clean boat, car, or truck. The conveniences of washing them at home or at a community/charity car wash can include enjoying the outdoors, taking your time, helping a good cause, and the relatively low cost. However, as simple as washing a vehicle may seem, there are a few things to consider so that you can protect both your vehicle and our environment.

HOW CAN WASHING YOUR VEHICLE AT HOME IMPACT OUR ENVIRONMENT?

In many cases, people tend to wash their vehicles on driveways or in parking lots, which tends to be constructed of a hard surface such as concrete or asphalt. This can be a problem because the hard surface will not allow pollutants such as dirt, oil/grease, and soapy water to soak into it. Instead, the pollutants may flow to the nearest storm drain, which are then discharged into local streams and ponds untreated.

If you choose to wash your vehicle at home or community/charity event instead of at a commercial car wash, which captures the polluted water and treats it at the wastewater treatment plant, here are some important tips to remember that will help protect our environment and reduce stormwater pollution:
